Notes from the Director

As we start the 2006-07 academic school year, we are looking forward to a number of adjustments within our school. You will read in this issue's Transitions that there have been a number of departures in our faculty and staff. I am sorry to see that these people have moved on, but they are taking on new roles and I wish them all the

One thing not mentioned in our transitions, but which will make a big difference, is a substantial upgrade to the technology within the building. The University has mandated that all buildings be wired with high-speed internet and the Art Building was one of the first to benefit from this half-million dollar upgrade. This is especially significant for our operations within the School of Art, as we depend more and more on advanced technology in the creation, manipulation and accession of digital images in all three divisions. Ten years ago we relied on just a few pods of computers and printers spread throughout the School. Today we have the largest and best equipped computer lab on campus, used by students in over 30 departments, as well as by numerous programs within the School, for instruction, resourcing and printing of large and complex digital files on large-format archival plotters. Students can visualize their solutions faster with greater detail and clarity than ever before. Another positive result of this upgrade is increased transfer speeds for moving newly created digital images to our Visual Services database and then on to instructors and students for art and design history courses. In the past students had to come to the building to review course-related images, but most classes now have these images online. You have read in previous Artifacts editions that we are digitizing parts of our Slide Library to better serve faculty, students and the greater University community. To date we have scanned and cataloged over 10,000 slides, providing teaching and review images for over two dozen courses. Our hope is to continue this process so that future classes will all be taught using digital technology.

We have had support from a few patrons and have written a few grants to assist us with this important task but would appreciate your help to achieve our goals more quickly. You may target your contribution to the Slide Library as a general fund, or donate to your specific area of interest. Thank you for considering a contribution and I look forward to telling you more about our technology upgrades as they are implemented.

Rebecca Cummins Associate Professor, Photography participated in a group show at the Quay Art Gallery, Toronto, as part of the Image Festival in April 2006, and she had work in the Shanghai Biennial at the Shanghai Art Museum, September 2006. She received a John H. Hauberg Fellowship for a residency at Pichuck Glass School, Stanwood, during May 2006, and her public art work, Aperture Projection Sundial, opened at the Montlake Branch of Seattle Public Library in August 2006.

A July 2006 show at Francine Seders Gallery, Seattle, titled Work by Gallery Artists included Michael Dailey Professor Ementus, Painting + Drawing, Denzil Hurley Professor, Painting + Drawing, Robert Jones Professor Emeritus, Painting + Drawing, and Oliva Britt '07.

Julia Freeman MfA Student, Fibers received an invitation to show her work in Seoul, South Korea, this autumn and was awarded a grant to install her work in the outdoor sculpture park at the Port Angeles Fine Arts Center.

Ellen Garvens Associate Professor, Pholography received a Royalty Research Fund Award in June 2006 to support her project titled "Photographing prosthetics/orthotics in Thailand, cao and Cambodia." Her work, which includes recording narratives by the patients she photographs, will take place during Winter Quarter 2007.

Layne Goldsmith Professor, Fibers traveled to Gangtok, Sikkim, India, in March 2006 to research study-abroad opportunities for UM students and faculty. Her trip was sponsored in part by Susan Jeffords, Vice Provost for Global Affairs, and Ellen Kaisse, Divisional Dean for Arts and Humanities.

Philip Govedare Associate Professor, Painting + Drawing has a solo exhibit at Hampshire College, Arnherst, during September 2006. While there he will also be a visiting artist and give a lecture. His next solo show will be at Pierce College, Lakewood, in January 2007.

Madia Jackinsky-Horrell and Ashley Verplank MA Students, Art History each received a Smithsonian Institution Graduate Student Fellowship to fund ten weeks of research. Verplank did her research on Tinigit daggers at the National Museum of the American Indian during Summer Quarter 2006, and Jackinsky-Horrell will be doing her research on Alutiiq masks at the National Museum of Natural History during Winter Quarter 2007.

Zhi Lin Associate Professor, Painting + Drawing will have a painting from his large-scale Execution Series in a Pacific Asia Museum exhibit, Los Angeles, from 10 November 2006 – 04 February 2007. Norman Lundin Professor Emeritus, Painting + Drawing gave a lecture titled "My Life in Art" at Seattle Public School's Summit K-12 in May 2006 as a fundraiser for the school's artist-in-residence program.

Alden Mason Professor Emeritus, Painting + Drawing had a oneman show at Foster/Mihite Gallery, Seattle, during May 2006. Helen O'Toole Associate Professor, Painting + Drawing had a solo show titled Dwellings at Linda Hodges Gallery, Seattle, from 02 March through 01 April 2006.

Christopher Ozubko *Professor, Visual Communication Design* has accepted a third five-year term as SoA Director, which began on 01 July 2006.




Akio Takamori Professor, Caramics received a Royalty Research Fund Scholar Award in June 2006 to support his project titled "Children of post-war Japan." He currently has two shows in the Puget Sound area: Between Clouds of Memory: The Ceramic Art of Akio Takamori at the Tacoma Art Museum through 08 October 2006 and Akio Takamori: The Laughing Monks at the Henry Art Gallery through 22 October 2006. A review of these shows, titled "The Evolution of Ceramist Akio Takamori," was in the Seattle Times on 07 July 2006. He was elected a fellow of the American Craft Council in 2006.

Timea Tihanyi Lecturer is a recipient of a 2006 CityArtist grant by the Seattle Office of Arts and Cultural Affairs and a 4Culture 2006 Special Project Grant. She will use these grants to make and exhibit a series of interactive soft sculptures, which will be on view during spring 2007 at Harborview Medical Center.

Doug Wadden *Professor, Visual Communication Design* has been appointed as the UW's Marsha and Jay Glazer Endowed University Professor for a five-year term.

Robin Wright Polessor Art listopy received a \$40,000 NEH grant and a \$15,000 matching grant from the UW College of Arts and Sciences to fund planning for an exhibit of Skidegate Haida house models and poles for the World's Columbian Exposition. In May 2006 she was appointed to the Bill Holm Endowed Professorship. During August 2006 she took four students to Indianapolis and Washington, DC, to see exhibits of Northwest Coast Native art.

Yasmi Wisecarver Indergraduate Student, Painting + Drawing was admitted with scholarship to the Port Avon School of Contemporary Art in Paris, France, for study during Summer Quarter 2006.

ROMA REPORTA

In Spring Quarter 2006 ten undergraduate and three graduate students participated in Art History's annual study abroad program in



Rome, this year led by Christine Göttler Associate Professor, Art History Two courses were offered: a broader course on key monuments and major urban projects in the city of Rome and a more specialized course on the interrelationship between the arts, sciences and religion in early modern Italy and Rome. Themes included cult images and decorative styles of the new religious orders, the rediscovery and reuse of medieval art, and the emergence of a new emotional culture at the end of the sixteenth century. The group examined, for instance, how the new cosmological discoveries affected ways of seeing. Particularly enjoyable and great learning experiences were communal undertakings on the field trips: the study of the great astrological cycles in Padua, Ferrara, and Caprarola; the civic monuments in Siena and Florence; and the very special aesthetics of the Venetian Renaissance. Other places in Italy were visited on the few "free" weekends, and the large student apartment in the Palazzo Pio turned into a laboratory of art historical research and a center of hospitality and culinary delights.

Christopher Ozubko Professor, Visual Communication Design led his second Exploration Seminar in Rome from 21 August to 22 September 2006. He was again assisted by Lisa Schultz '03, who provided the students with art historical preparation. The students are taking two classes: "Type I Form I Function: A Typographic Survey of Rome" and "The Power of Images: The Art of Propagands." Judi Clark Director of Academic Advising and Student Services, who was visiting the Rome Center to better understand what it offers students, joined the group for some of their field trips and shared her art historical knowledge as well

During Autumn Quarter 2006 the 12th Annual Studio Art Rome Program is being led by Jamie Walker Professor, Ceramics and Curt Labitzke Associate Professor, Printmaking. Three graduate students and twenty-one undergraduate students are participating. We look forward to a report in the next newsletter of their adventures.

Unfortunately, our loss will present a challenge in the near future for students in the program. The Metals program has had a proud history spanning over 90 years with numerous luminaries that have brought national recognition. I want to thank Mary for her contributions and for bringing the program

It is our intention to offer the best experience to current majors in the Metals Program and help them complete their degrees, but, without faculty in place, I have had to place a moratorium on incoming students until the School has the necessary resources to offer a rigorous and high quality curriculum. During the upcoming year I will work closely with the co-chairs in the Division of Art to create a taskforce to assess the current situation and strategize ways to best position the program in the School. This task force will seek the opinions of students, alumni and faculty.

We are now at a point of transition where we wish to move the Metals program towards the same quality and prominence that it has seen in its illustrious past. It is my hope and desire, as well as the faculty's, that the School will see a positive result within the next two years. Through this transition year I ask for your support and encouragement to assist us in our endeavor to integrate metals within our School, University and region.



TRANSITIONS

Dick Law Instructional Technician II, Ceramics retired in June 2006 after thirty years of service to the SoA (we mistakenly said it was only twenty-seven years in the last newsletter). He is already enjoying his retirement by traveling. The person moving into that position is John Taylor. John has a BA from Alfred University and an MFA from the University of Massachusetts/Amherst. He moved to the Northwest ten years ago and has been actively teaching and running his own studio business, Taylor Tile.

The Academic Advising and Student Services Office in the SoA has seen a number of changes in the last six months. Autumn Yoke Academic Adviser was hired in March 2006 to replace Kate Bagley, who had departed to become a full-time mother. Yoke came to the SoA after several years of working with students in the School of Music. She is now the primary adviser for undergraduates in Fibers, Photography, and Painting+ Drawing. Lori Moskal Academic Adviser resigned in May 2006 so that she could join her husband in San Diego, CA, and attend graduate school there. After some reorganization, the office hired Meg Zabielski Program Coordinator.

Kathleen Moles Program Coordinator, Art Media Center left the SoA after seven years to take the position of Curator of Art at the Whatcom Museum of History and Art in Bellingham.

Among faculty, Riley Brewster Assistant Professor, Painting + Drawing and John Rousseau Assistant Professor, Visual Communication Design departed in June. Shih-shan Susan Huang Assistant Professor, Art History has left the SoA to take a position at Rice University in Houston, TX. Mary Hu Professor, Metals will retire at the end of Autumn Quarter 2006.

The Division of Design welcomes **Sang-gyeun Ahn** as an assistant professor in its Industrial Design Program. Ahn holds three degrees in design: his first is from KookMin University in Seoul, Korea, where he received his undergraduate degree in Design in 1996 with a specialization in Metals; his first graduate degree in Industrial Design is from Purdue University, where he received his master's in 2000; and his third degree is an MFA in Industrial Design from the University of Illinois/Urbana-Champaign, which he received in 2002. Ahn has also had extensive professional experience as a product designer during the 1990s for Kia Motors and the Korean Institute of Design. He has received some of the most distinguished awards in the Industrial Design profession, the latest being the Luminary Award (grand prize) in the 2005 international Red Dot Design Competition (http://www.red-dot.de), and in 2002 he won the Grand Prize in the 6th International Bicycle Design Competition.

This year the Division of Art History is fortunate to welcome two outstanding scholars in the field of Italian art to its faculty. The husband and wife team come to the SoA from Michigan State University. Estelle Lingo, whose research centers on Italian Baroque sculpture, received her PhD from Brown University. She is the recipient of many awards and honors, the latest of which is a Rush H. Kress Fellowship for the 2006-2007 academic year. Professor Lingo will be doing research at the Villa I Tatti, Florence, Italy, during this period. Stuart Lingo has an equally impressive record and has received high commendations for his research and teaching. He received his PhD from Harvard University and specializes in Italian Renaissance painting and architecture. His latest research focuses on late Renaissance/early modern Italian art, most notably Bronzino, Vasari and Barocci. During Autumn Quarter 2006 he is teaching a class titled "The Corpus of Renaissance Art: The Ideal Body and Representation, 1400–1600."

FLINTRIDGE 2005/2006

Three of the ten recipients of Flintridge Foundation 2005/2006 Awards for Visual Artists have SoA connections: Lauren Grossman '83, Michael Spafford Professor Emeritus, Painting + Drawing and Jamie Walker Professor, Ceramics. There were 863 applicants for these awards, which "honor California, Oregon and Washington artists working in fine arts and crafts media whose work demonstrates high artistic merit and a distinctive voice for 20 or more years." This is the fifth time that these awards have been offered on a biennial basis, and it is the last year they will be awarded since the foundation has redefined its focus.
